

Please do give this the consideration that it deserves.


MEMBERSHIP - AUGUST 2022



CLUB SAFETY

Workplace manslaughter is now a jailable offence

The Workplace Safety Legislation Amendment (Workplace Manslaughter and Other Matters) Act 2019 is now in effect, commencing 1 July 2020.

The new law is designed to strengthen workplace safety in Victoria. It aims to prevent workplace death and provide a strong deterrent for officers, organisations and employers to comply with their OHS obligations. It will see tougher penalties where a workplace death is caused by criminal negligence.

Elements of the offence of workplace manslaughter

The elements of the new workplace manslaughter offence are:

- the person charged must be a body corporate or a person who is not an employee or volunteer
- they must have owed the victim a specified duty under the OHS Act
- they breached the duty owed by negligent conduct
- the breach of the duty caused the death of the victim, and
- if the person charged is a natural person they must have acted consciously and voluntarily when breaching the duty owed

Who can be charged with workplace manslaughter?

Organisations and self-employed persons

Organisations and self-employed persons who hold specified duties under the OHS Act (as outlined below) can be prosecuted for the offence of workplace manslaughter. Organisations include:

- bodies corporate (for example, registered companies)
- incorporated associations
- statutory authorities
- trustee of a trust
- unincorporated bodies and unincorporated associations
- Partnerships
- Government entities
- Officers
- Officers of body corporates, partnerships, and unincorporated bodies or associations may also be charged with the offence of workplace

- manslaughter if their organisation holds specified duties under the OHS Act.
- Officers are individuals at the highest level of an organisation, who have the power and resources to improve safety, including:

Negligent conduct

For the purposes of workplace manslaughter, conduct will be considered 'negligent' if it involves:

- a great falling short of the standard of care that a reasonable person would have taken in the circumstances, and
- a high risk of death, serious injury or serious illness

Negligent conduct also includes a failure to act (an 'omission'), for example it may include when a person:

- does not adequately manage, control or supervise its employees, or
- does not take reasonable action to fix a dangerous situation, where failing to do so causes a high risk of death, serious injury or serious illness

The test is based on the existing common law test for criminal negligence in Victoria, and is an appropriately high standard considering the significant penalties for the new offence.

BARHAM-KOONDROOK LIONS CLUB BINGO HITS FOUR-OHH..... FORTY

The Bingo Night of 22nd June 2022 was a special occasion for our Lions Club Bingo, as we reached the forty-year milestone of (almost) continuous calling. Aside from a couple of Covid 19 restricted months last year, and the break between Christmas and New Year, every Wednesday night it's been "heads down" at 8.00 pm sharp. For the statisticians, that means around four million calls!

It was in May 1982 that the fledgling Barham Lions Club were looking for a fund-raising enterprise, and knowing that the Deniliquin Club ran Bingo Nights, they decided to muscle in on the action. After a few visits to Deniliquin, ostensibly to find out all about running Bingo (but rumour has it, to also crack the odd tinny or two), the club decided to give it a go.

A fear that other community organisations might beat them to the punch led to the rapid purchase of a second hand bingo machine, from the Deni Club. They also figured out where to get hold of bingo books and the other stuff needed to run Bingo. The first machine was not one of the digital state of the art gizmos now used, but a cage full of numbered ping pong balls and an air blower. A scribe jotted down the numbers as they were drawn.

Them days they charged the princely sum of two dollars per book. Forty years later, we STILL charge two dollars per book. We figure our Bingo Nights keeps the more mature members of our community off the streets and out of trouble, as well as giving our club a few dollars to lend assistance to worthy causes where needed. It also keeps a crew of (mostly) five Lions Club volunteers occupied for the night, on a roster basis.

The first night's Bingo reportedly went well, with a big turnout and a healthy return on the club's investment looking likely. The second night was not such a success, and the third and fourth nights even worse. The club actually lost money on the fourth night. Ever resourceful, the directive went out to club members to "invite" their partners/ spouses to the fifth (and a few more) nights. Fortunately, things picked up as word spread, and after a couple of months, a regular cliental had formed.

Some nights there would be over eighty players, all jammed into the old, corrugated iron "supper shed"

that was located more or less where the Machismo Sculpture is now located in Riverside Park. The

shed had formerly been relocated from the prisoner of war camp at Tullakool and was not exactly fitted out for the comfort and convenience of occupants. So much so that the air was often blue with cigarette smoke in winter, due to lack of ventilation as all the doors and windows were shut to try and keep the player warm. So much for OH&S!

The Lions Bingo even made it into "Post" Magazine circa 1990"s, with a picture of the early advertising signs that were mounted on the roof of the old concrete block dunny in Riverside Park. John Boyd assures us that he still has those signs "somewhere"

Around these times, through a series of convoluted and time-consuming processes, the Barham Lions Club had become the caretakers of the Barham School of Arts. This was later formalized by the appointment of the Club as a Section 355 LGA Committee of Wakool Council This gave the club

However, there remained the problem of running Bingo from the rather dilapidated and unsuitable "Supper Room" AKA the old tin shed. So, in the late 1990's negotiations began with Wakool Shire Council to build a new "Supper Room" onto the back of the School of Arts. Armed with a sizable chunk of money raised through Bingo, the Lions Club was able to gain Council's support for a new room. The concept was subsequently expanded to include a new set of Council Offices (to replace the oversized cupboard that was the Barham Office at the time) a new library, and a set of public toilets. Although some revision was required to fit the project to available funds, the new Riverside Reception Room, Library, Council Offices and toilets were opened in 2001

All of this through money raised from Bingo. And we still raise funds to this day, that go towards meeting our Lions Club's commitment to serve the community.

In conclusion, full recognition must be given to a couple of stalwarts in our Lions Club. Without John Boyd, Phillip Williamson and Graham Minnis, there probably would not be any Bingo Nights. Their dedication and unstinting commitment through the years has enabled our club to carry on with this enterprise through some difficult times. We look forward to our 50th year milestone.


The Australian Lions Foundation Community Service Award


