# **CLUB SAFETY**

It's vital that you understand the invisible dangers larynx and ovaries and is also of asbestos

It's estimated 4000 Australians die from asbestosrelated diseases every year and tradies are among the most at risk for asbestos exposure. Breathing in asbestos fibres can lead to diseases such as asbestosis, lung cancer, and mesothelioma.

These diseases can take decades to develop and have no known cure. They can cause debilitating illness and premature death. As a young apprentice fitter and machinist, Brian Healy was exposed unsafely to asbestos in the workplace, leading to his diagnosis of mesothelioma, a rare form of cancer.

"Being young, you did what the boss told you to do.... and you just did your job. But the only one who's going to suffer later on down the track will be you if you don't look after yourself."

Brian's lived experience is a reminder of the dangerous consequences of working unsafely with asbestos.

What is asbestos - Asbestos is the name for a group of minerals that were used to manufacture a wide range of products including many that were used in Australian buildings until the mid-late 1980s. Exposure to asbestos fibres may cause diseases such as mesothelioma, lung cancer and asbestosis.

Scientific studies reviewed by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC, 2012) show that asbestos can also cause cancer of the asbestos.

associated with pharynx, stomach and colorectal cancer.

Asbestos exposure standard - The asbestos exposure standard does not represent a 'risk free' level at which every employee can be guaranteed absolute protection from any asbestos related illness. Nor does the asbestos exposure standard constitute a 'fine line' between satisfactory and unsatisfactory working conditions.

Asbestos is banned - Use of asbestos is banned in Australia. You must not import, manufacture, supply, sell, use or reuse asbestos or products that contain asbestos. The asbestos ban came into force at the end of 2003. However, some materials asbestos inadvertently containing may be imported.

Under the law there are duties and requirements for managing asbestos in workplaces, working with removing asbestos.Further asbestos and information on imports and processes can be found on the Asbestos Safety and Eradication Agency and Australian Border Force websites.

Asbestos case study - In May 2018 WorkSafe received a report of suspected asbestos being removed from a residential property. WorkSafe Inspectors attended the property and observed two workers undertaking demolition work using hand tools. The workers were not wearing any personal protective equipment (PPE). An independent hygienist confirmed the building contained

Both clubs are expecting to add more new members shortly, so it is really great to see them growing and getting stronger.

The month concluded with another DG training Zoom meeting on November 29, and then a Zone 7 meeting at Corowa on November 30. It was a busy but very satisfying month.

#### **NOVEMBER MEMBERSHIP UPDATE**

This has been a good month for our district, with quite a few clubs inducting new members and having positive expectations that more are on the way. The recent additions are not yet reflected in the official numbers shown in MyLCI, so our numbers should look better again next month.

So, some clubs are proving that it is possible to grow. Are they doing something special? No, not really, but they are doing something that many are not – put simply, they are ASKING.

We all enjoy being Lions, and serving our community, don't we? So why don't we share that all the time? When I do my shopping and have a conversation with the staff, when they ask about my day I tell them about something positive that I have been involved with in Lions. When we run a BBQ or other function, we thank people for their attendance, and let them know how their purchase will help their community. This is often a conversation starter, opening the way to a discussion about the joys of being a Lion. You can have a few practiced thoughts and lines ready to mention at such times, and the more you do it, the easier it is and the more it flows naturally. Tell them about some of the other terrific/exciting things that the club does in the community. Share the fun, and the joy. Then ask them to come along and support something else that your club is doing, and before you know it, they will be asking you about joining!

Sometimes people seem interested, but mention that they are time poor and say that they will "leave it till they have more time". I don't think anyone ever actually finds more time at any point, which means the best time is now. I practiced this approach just this last weekend. I was speaking to a lady who was interested in Lions, but wanted to leave it until she retired so she would have more time. I mentioned that it would probably be better to get involved now, even if she cannot do much, so that she can learn the ropes and functions of the club, just attend when she can, and then be ready and confident to do more when she was able. She liked this approach and agreed. Unfortunately, she is not from our district, but at least she will now become a Lion.

We can all do this.

#### **USING LICOLA TO ASSIST FLOOD VICTIMS - A DISTRICT PROJECT**

We are all aware of the terrible floods that have devastated significant parts of our district. Many townspeople have lost their possessions when their homes flooded, and many farming communities have suffered extensive crop losses, damage to fencing and stock losses.

As always, local Lions clubs have swung into action and provided immediate, practical support.

A district-wide project is now underway to help provide some help and support during the recovery phase, by utilising the facilities at Licola to provide a free holiday to selected affected families. We will shortly be asking all clubs to nominate and make contact with suitable families, to offer them a free holiday from January 9-13, 2023. We would be looking for one or two parents, and their children as the ideal groups to attend. 100 places are available, so that might be around 25-30 families, preferably including a mix of town and country people.

Travel will be arranged and provided, as will hampers containing gift vouchers, comfort packs and more. Some special treats are also being arranged, and we hope to have free mental health support and counselling services on hand at Licola (with no requirement for people to use them, but to be available for those that want to).

A letter with details and a nomination form will soon be sent out to all club secretaries and zone chairs – please be on the lookout for this and circulate it widely. We will need nominations fairly quickly so that the families can be contacted with sufficient notice to ensure that they are available to travel.

We will also be looking for Lions to volunteer to assist that week – more details will be in the letter, but if you are interested in being involved, please try to keep that week free.

On Sunday 27th November, 5 Leos and 3 Cubs travelled to "Rochie South" the village being constructed at Elmore for flood evacuees from Rochester.





V6 District Disaster Recovery Support Team have been working with Downer Management Team at "Rochie South" Evacuation center at the Elmore Field Days site.


While the Government is putting in place accommodation for the evacuees, there is no playground or outdoor equipment for the children to play on.

#### **COMMUNITY PLAYGROUND AREA & GARDEN**



The first Lions Diabetic Alert Dog was delivered freeof-charge by Australian Lions Hearing Dogs on the 17th of October in Adelaide, South Australia. For Eliza, receiving Sal was like two long lost friends finding one another.

'I've wanted a Diabetic Alert Dog ever since I first learnt about them. But I also knew it was an expensive process, plus getting the right dog from the right provider... well, I never thought about it too much further.

Diabetes is a very expensive illness to live with. While it has been cheaper with the recent government subsidies, prior to this year, it probably costed me about seven grand a year just to live with diabetes. Adding the cost of training a dog, it was not sustainable, not on top of mortgage and everything else.

When I heard about the Lions Medical Alert Dog Program, well, I got in contact with Laura. And getting Sal has been great! She fits me so well. I just take her everywhere, it's almost like having a new baby! I get my little bag and off we go. Knowing that she isn't just a best friend but could also save my life... it's pretty astounding.

I think Sal has definitely bonded with me. I'm like her mum and she's like my daughter. Sal has actually picked up my hypos (low blood glucose levels) since day one. Our first week together she had alerted to four hypo events. This happened while I was cooking and while we were out at a café; she knew her priorities even with all the smells of food around her. Plus, I can imagine my hypos would smell very different from the samples she was trained with, so for her to pick it up and come straight to me was pretty amazing!'

Sal was delivered just in time for World Diabetes Day, which falls on the 14th November, and is the first of many Diabetic Alert Dogs to come. This is just the start of our Medical Alert Program; a gift from Lions to the Australian community. To read more about Sal and Eliza, subscribe to our newsletter or visit our Facebook.





2022 has been a wild and busy year for Australian Lions Hearing Dogs. With Australia and border restrictions finally recovering from Covid, we were able to get back on our feet. This year our team has not only set several new records, but also went above and beyond! The end of 2022 was met with 31 Hearing Assistance Dogs delivered. These dogs improve the independence and security to people who are deaf or hard of hearing, and has proven time and time again that they play a vital role in reducing the feelings of isolation that comes as a challenge to hearing loss. However, that's not all. Our very first Diabetic Alert dog from the Medical Alert Program was placed here in Adelaide mid-October! This is a huge accomplishment as it is the start of our Medical Alert Program. We are excited to see the good our Diabetic Alert dogs will bring to people with type 1 diabetes.

Our team were able to accredit 17 dogs this year, but we are expecting 5 more to be done before 2023 arrives; a total of 59 flights taken all across Australia in 2022! Accreditation occurs after the dogs have completed their minimum of 3 months follow up in a client's home and are alerting to sounds at a high standard.

Our Breeding Program, which was only started recently, has already brought about 15 puppies into our world year to date, but we are expecting another litter of puppies to be born in December, which will bring the total numbers of puppies born up to 20 plus or more! Because of this, 32 new puppy partnerships were created this year by the Puppy Program, plus 9 more to go within the year. With the help of their foster homes, these puppies will be loved, given attention, learn boundaries and socialisation. Currently, there are 18 puppies placed in foster care, but the number will be up to 26 before January 2023 comes.

We also have had many wonderful sponsors from both Lions Clubs and individual supporters of our puppies. We couldn't have made it without them and we're extremely grateful for the help and opportunity that they've provided Australian Lions Hearing Dogs. The volunteer program has thrived as always, with over 30 volunteers involved in the program, always there to help and give the dogs the enrichment and love they need to be happy and healthy. We are still hard at work on our Capital Campaign and while we've made progress, we still have some ways to go before reaching our goal!
